

Introduction

The Research Literacy & Justice Project (RLJP) met with 15 Black/African American community- and faith-based organizations to better understand their thoughts and preferences of educational materials created to inform a culturally appropriate, clinical trial educational toolkit.

The goal was to amplify their feedback and co-create clinical trial materials designed to improve equitable participation in clinical research as well as health outcomes in Black/African American communities.





What we learned

There is a lack of trust in the healthcare system and clinical research is a significant barrier that prevents Black/African American people from participating in clinical trials.



Clinical trial engagement and educational materials are not culturally sensitive to, specifically for, or inclusive of Black /African American people.



Clinical trial educational materials should focus on key concerns for Black/African American people and Black/African American scientists who lead clinical trials.

🔂 Several health conditions were identified that are concerns, including:

Breast cancer Diabetes Heart disease High blood pressure

Anxiety Depression Trauma
